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**Description:** This engraving is of a scene from Genesis. In the Judeo-Christian tradition, Hagar (far right) was the slave of Sarah (far left). Sarah was the wife of the biblical patriarch Abraham, but due to her infertility, they had no children. To ensure Abraham's line would continue, he fathered a child, Ishmael, with Hagar. Several years later, Sarah became able to conceive and gave birth to her and Abraham's son Isaac. The birth of Isaac led to tension between the two women and the two children. Eventually, Abraham exiled Hagar and Ishmael at Sarah's bidding.

In the Islamic tradition, Hagar and Ishmael are named Hajar and Ismail, and Hajar was Abraham's (Ibrahim's) wife. After Hajar and Ismail were cast out when Ismail was a baby, God sent them a spring of water in the middle of the desert to help them survive. This spring became the Zamzam Well in Mecca and is considered holy by Muslims.
