

WHAT IS COLLECTIONS MANAGEMENT?

Collections management for museums involves the care, documentation, and organization of a museum's collection of objects or artworks. It's a comprehensive process that ensures the preservation, accessibility, and legal compliance of the items within a museum's holdings.



WORKING WITH ADINKRA SYMBOLS

One of my primary projects was to organize Ghanian objects in the collection that featured Adinkra symbols. . These symbols originated from Ghana and can represent concepts and character traits. Many are found on fabrics, goldweights, and pottery.



OBJECT HANDLING

On my second day, I received object-handling training from one of the conservators, Molly Gleeson. She walked us through the proper protocol for carefully unpacking, repacking, and moving different types of objects



RESEARCHING MOROCCAN JEVELRY MAKING

I researched traditional Moroccan jewelry-making techniques to help reconstruct what a necklace in the collections would have looked like. I had never worked with jewelry before, so I loved the experience of handling the pendants and beads to piece it back together.
